Caring for Creation from Indifference to making a Difference

As a pre-teen boy I enjoyed the woodsy air, hiking in our farm bush. One day, by the bushes edge I found a pile of rusting tins and bottles (some broken) which I found fascinating and started collecting the fancy bottles. I thought nothing about my God-fearing grandparents feeling this was an a convenient no cost disposal method. They had no awareness of their abusing God's Creation. It was in the age of indifference.

Fast forward to the present, because of catastrophic damage from weather extremes, most polluting industries are now realizing that solely profit focused management is proving costly. For example: the indigenous peoples are at risk of losing their livelihood from the land which can damage their identity and fracture their sense of community.

I used to blame polluting industries for desecrating Mother Earth; then I began to realize that when pointing at others as the problem, I had 3 fingers point back at me. I now see that I was in fact abusing myself, my loved ones and everyone else through my relative indifference. I asked myself what would the world be like if everyone did as I, in caring for creation.

I asked myself, if it's to be, it's up to me. What am I doing?

- > Starting to pick up items while I walk hoping, maybe naively, others will think twice about tossing cans, cups and wrappers in the streets.
- Avoiding buying any food packed in Styrofoam which takes 100 years to disintegrate.
- > Flushing toilet only when necessary.
- > Taking recyclable items out of the Fairview Villa's garbage bin.
- Driving my car when I have several tasks in one locale to reduce carbon footprint

But there is another effect of weather beyond extremes happening. It's called Eco-anxiety which moves from creation care...to selfcare. Eco anxiety is the fear of environmental doom, the anxiety which affects mental health resulting from feeling helpless, a sense of being cocooned. To move from the emotional numbness of feeling powerless, we need to accept our fear and change not what we think, rather how we think.

When feeling overwhelmed, we need to remind ourselves that every small change we made helps contribute to the global effort to reverse climate change. **Gandhi said, "be the change you want to see in the world.**" Margaret Mead said it best, "never doubt that a small group of thoughtful committed people can change the world. It's the only thing that ever has."

Each day, I hope you will join me in reflecting on what we are doing as harming or healing Mother Earth. As believers in God's will for God's creation we can do no less than lovingly save our Creation as our Lord has done for us. By Will Stoltz
